

Empowering Governments to Combat Labor and Trafficking Crimes

The Attaining Lasting Change for Better Enforcement of Labor and Criminal Law to Address Child Labor, Forced Labor and Human Trafficking (ATLAS) project supports government efforts to combat child labor (CL), forced labor (FL), and human trafficking (HT) through strengthening legal frameworks, improving enforcement of the labor and criminal frameworks, and increasing coordination between government and social protection entities. ATLAS is a four-year project currently operating in Thailand and Paraguay, with discussions underway with the governments of Liberia and Argentina to begin work in those countries in the fourth quarter. In 2019, ATLAS laid the groundwork for the project by opening field offices; hiring staff; and developing key project documents, including the Body of Knowledge, Pre-Situational Analysis, and the Comprehensive Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Plan, which are described below.

Differentiated Model of Practice Strategy

To strengthen enforcement systems and coordination mechanisms, ATLAS developed a unique, evidence-based approach known as differentiated model of practice (DMOP) for achieving project outcomes. This ninestep strategy will tailor interventions based on the Body of Knowledge and the in-country pre-situational analysis of each ATLAS country; pilot and evaluate interventions for effectiveness; and refine, implement, and institutionalize them.

ATLAS Start-Up Highlights



Body of Knowledge (BOK)

To support and inform ATLAS' work, the project compiled a research document that evaluates the effectiveness of interventions in the realms of legal frameworks, enforcement, and coordination. ATLAS assessed existing studies to determine whether specific interventions successfully reduced CL, FL, and HT.



Comprehensive Monitoring and Evaluation Plan (CMEP) Workshops

In preparation for the CMEP, the project held two workshops, one in Bangkok and one in Washington, DC. The workshops brought together stakeholders—including the ATLAS team, partner organizations, and representatives from the US and international governments—to learn about the project's key definitions, theory of change, activity map and result framework, indicator development, and donor M&E and reporting requirements.





Pre-Situational Analyses (PSAs)

ATLAS conducts a PSA before initiating activities in a country to inform the design of the

interventions. The PSA analyzes the country's laws, statements, enforcement, and coordination around CL, FL, and HT. The PSA serves as a baseline for ATLAS and identifies the gaps and recommends solutions to improve instances of CL, FL, and HT. ATLAS has completed the PSAs for Thailand and Paraguay, which it will share with partner organizations and government stakeholders.

Paraguay PSA Validation Meeting

ATLAS held a validation meeting in Paraguay that brought together representatives from government ministries, international organizations, workers unions, business associations, and civil society organizations. At the meeting, participants validated the PSA findings, ranked the effective interventions by their relevance to ATLAS' objectives, and provided input on proposed activities to address the findings.



Thailand Government Engagement

ATLAS engaged productively with the Thai government at every step of the process and received their endorsement to operate in Thailand. Before beginning activities there, ATLAS held coordination meetings with various ministries to ensure that the project's vision aligned with that of the government. The CMEP workshop held in Bangkok included presentations from the Ministry of Labor, Royal Thai Police, and Office of the Attorney General, which all submitted input that was included in the final version of the Thailand PSA.

ATLAS Takeaway

In the first year and a half of the project, ATLAS has developed a significant knowledge base from which it can build interventions, design activities, and establish strong relationships with host country governments, partner organizations, and others. ATLAS also has developed the innovative DMOP strategy that allows interventions to be tailored to specific country contexts and integrated sustainably into existing frameworks.
