


Project Purpose



- Conduct a representative survey during the 2018/19 cocoa harvest season
- Develop population estimates for the prevalence of working children, child labor, and the worst forms of child labor in agriculture, including the cocoa sector, in the cocoa growing areas of Côte d'Ivoire and Ghana
- Use those estimates to measure changes in the prevalence in the worst forms of child labor compared to data collected in these same areas in 2008/9 and 2013/14
- Assess progress toward Harkin-Engel Protocol goals, including the goal of reducing worst forms of child labor by 70 percent by 2020

Child Labor Definition





Previous Survey Findings



Cocoa Growing Areas of Ghana	2008/9	2013/14	Percent Change
Children working in cocoa production	997,357 46%	957,398 43%	-7%
Child laborers working in cocoa production	947,777 44%	918,543 41%	-6%
Children working in the cocoa sector in hazardous work	931,005 43 %	878,595 39%	-9%

Data Collection Areas



The surveys will be administered to 1,314 households, located in **73 enumeration areas** (EAs) in Ghana. These EAs are classified as **high-**, **medium- or low-**level, according to their cocoa production.

Within each EA, 18 households will be interviewed as well as several key members of the community.

Tools and Respondents



Instrument	Respondent
Head of Household Questionnaire	Household head, household head's spouse, or other knowledgeable adult household member in each sampled household
Child Questionnaire	All child household members aged 5-17 in each sampled household
Community Leader Questionnaire	Village chief(s) within geographic catchment area of EA
School Questionnaire	Head Teacher or Deputy Head Teacher at every school (public/private, primary/secondary) within geographic catchment area of EA
Cocoa Shed Survey	Manager or other knowledgeable employee at every cocoa shed within geographic catchment area of EA; where no cocoa shed exists within EA, nearby site serving the largest number of farms in EA should be selected

Data Collection Timeline



- November 5-9: Classroom training
- November 10-11: Field-based pilot
- November 12: Rest day
- November 13-14: Debrief, remediation, preparations, and travel
- November 15: Begin data collection
- December 20: Complete data collection
