PROBLEM TO BE ADDRESSED	In November 2010, members of the ILO's Governing Body formally endorsed a <i>Roadmap for Achieving the Elimination of the Worst Forms of Child Labor by 2016</i> . This project aims to support and further the goals of the Roadmap. Many countries have taken measures to address child labor and forced labor but significant gaps still remain.
PROJECT OBJECTIVES	The GAP project will focus on (1) building the capacity of national governments and developing strategic policies to address the elimination of child labor and forced labor; (2) improving the evidence base through data collection and research; and (3) strengthening legal protections and social service delivery for child domestic workers.
SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES	The project is designed to reach these objectives through the following activities: <i>Capacity Building</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Identify gaps in the child labor legal/regulatory framework in target countries• Provide technical assistance to key stakeholders to more effectively monitor and enforce child labor laws and regulations• Assist target countries in developing National Action Plans or other policies to address child labor and forced labor
