As an Assistant Professor of Sociology who teaches courses on gender and human sexuality, I object in the strongest of terms to mandating birth control with no copays under the Affordable Care Act.

As a feminist, this proposal does NOT help men and women achieve equal standing in American society. This proposal only facilitates the existing discrimination against women because they can get pregnant. Equality is NOT achieved by doling out contraceptives. Equality is achieved by supporting women with children in the workforce through a variety of methods such as a federally mandated paid maternity leave or subsidized child care options. The ultimate solution should be geared towards helping families, not eliminating them. Americans should not be forced to pay for a service (i.e., contraceptives) that perpetuates gender discrimination.
