
National Agricultural Workers Survey

- National survey of <u>crop</u> <u>workers</u>, started fiscal year 1989
- Annual random sample survey of 1,500-3,000 workers
- Establishment survey find workers at work
- Only source of reliable information on crop worker demographics
- Limited regional coverage and no local numbers


NAWS Data

- Two time periods will be compared: 1999-2000 and 2013-2014; these time points are referred to as 2000 and 2014 throughout the talk.
- The 2013-2014 data are preliminary; this PowerPoint may not be released at this time
- Total US sample sizes were 7,198 in 1999-2000
- and 4,235 in 2013-2014.
- Midwest Stream sample sizes were 1,443 in 1999-2000 and 885 in 2013-2014.
- <u>Suppressed values</u> are identified with a superscript 'b' and have fewer than four observations or have relative standard errors greater than 50 percent.
- Values to be <u>interpreted with caution</u> are identified with a superscript 'a', and have relative standard errors between 31 and 50 percent


NAWS Migrant Streams




Trend in Share of Farmworkers Born Abroad




Trend In Share of Farmworkers Identified As Indigenous




Farmworkers' Current Legal Status




Trend In Share of Farmworkers Who Are Migrant




Trend in Gender Distribution of Farmworkers







Trend In Farmworkers' Average Age




Trend In Average Years of Education Completed




Family Composition

Setting the Stage

What are some of the ways that workers come in contact with pesticide residues?

What are some of the things that workers can do to minimize exposure?



Purpose of the Hygiene Supplement

EPA wanted to find out information on workers' potential exposure to pesticide residues

- Time spent in contact with crops
- Workers bathing/showering behavior
- Clothing workers are wearing
- Are work clothes washed before being re worn



Constraints for Developing Hygiene Supplement

- Observational or selfreported data
- Could only ask limited number of questions with limited time
- Needed to keep answers concise and factual



Focuses for Developing Hygiene Supplement

- Length of work day
- Location and time of bath/shower
- Three specific pieces of clothing:
 - Pants
 - Long sleeve shirts
 - Short sleeve shirts

Factors in Designing Questions for the Hygiene Supplement

Issue	Solutions
What can workers remember and report accurately?	Questions focused on "today" and "yesterday"
Avoiding potentially embarrassing questions	 Placement of supplement within the survey as a whole Wording of questions Introductions to questions
Avoiding socially correct answers	Wording of questionsIntroductions to questions



EPA Pilot Testing

One-on-one interviews with workers in Florida, California and Texas in 2009 and 2010

- Obtaining feedback on how participants interpreted the questions
- Asking participants for suggestions and possible alternative wording
- Engaging respondents in:
 - Describing their activities after completing their work for the remainder of the day
 - Describing their personal hygiene practices

Hours at Work

The average work day was 9.2 hours long. Half of crop workers have workdays that are between 8.3 and 10.0 hours long. The shortest workday was 2.4 hours and the longest 18 hours.

Ability to Bathe After Work

- Nearly all (99%)
 farmworkers bathed
 after the end of the
 workday.
- Nearly all (99%)
 farmworkers bathed at home.

Time Between Work and Bathing in Hours

Ninety-six percent of respondents reported bathing on the same day as their first work day. The remaining four percent said they bathed one day later.

Clothing Farmworkers Wore

On the first day,

- 99% wore pants
- 65% wore one shirt type
 - 42% wore long sleeves
 - 23% wore short sleeves
- 35% wore both short and long sleeve shirts
- 34% wore "other" clothing



Other Clothing Articles

(Source: National Agricultural Workers Survey, 2013-2014)

Common "other clothing"

- Outerwear including coat, vest, jacket, hoodie, sweatshirt or sweater
- Coveralls or Overalls
- Gloves
- Bandana
- Cap/Hat

Less Common: Shorts, Apron



- Nearly all workers said they wore pants on the first work day (99%).
- 15 percent of them reported that they were wearing the same pants on the second day.
- 10 percent wore pants that had not been laundered.

Clothing Articles: Long Sleeve Shirt



- 77 percent of workers said they wore a long sleeve shirt on the previous day.
- 13 percent of them reported that they were wearing the same long sleeve shirt on the second day.
- 8 percent wore a long sleeve shirt that had not been laundered.

Clothing Articles: Short Sleeve Shirt



- 58 percent of workers said they wore a short sleeve shirt on the previous day;
- 14 percent of them reported that they were wearing the same short sleeve shirt on the second day.
- 8 percent wore a short sleeve shirt that had not been laundered

Clothing Articles: Other



- 34 percent of workers said they wore "other" clothing article on the first work day.
- 51 percent of them reported that they were wearing the same "other" clothing article on the second day.



Farmworkers Wearing Unwashed Clothing

(Source: National Agricultural Workers Survey, 2013-2014)



On the interview day:

- 11 percent of crop workers wore one or more unwashed items
- 89 percent wore all washed clothing

Frequency of Unwashed Clothes

Status	Percent of farmworkers
Wore unwashed clothes on the interview day	11%
Wore clean clothes but has worn unwashed clothes on other days	18%
Wore unwashed clothes at some point	28%
