lowa continues to analyze Adult participant counts, as it continues to be lower than expected. Identified reasons during this reporting period include: the COVID-19 pandemic and potential

updates needing to be made to service reporting categories. Increases are anticipated as reporting improves and pandemic recovery continues. Co-enrollment continues to be a priority for the

state which will also increase counts. In response to reporting, the state continues to refine reporting categories. AJCs were closed to transition to an emergency response to the pandemic

starting mid-March 2020. Participants in this reporting cycle included those receiving services 7/01/2020-6/30/2021, coinciding with the pandemic response. Career planners shifted immediately

to assisting with UI in an emergency response to help individuals with various pandemic unemployment activities. In addition, work search requirements were waived. As such, lowa is beginning to see the pandemic impact outcomes this cycle with Empl 2nd quarter and Median Earnings 2nd quarter including individuals exiting program services 7/1/19-6/30/20. These two measures are

beginning to reflect the effects of the pandemic in workforce delivery system. Empl 4th quarter and Credential Attainment while reflecting program exiters in calendar year 2019 (1/1/2019-12/31/2019), appear to have been impacted as career planners were challenged during the onset of the pandemic to maintain participant contact to ensure positive outcomes.
