The Fostering Access, Rights and Equity (FARE) grant program helps marginalized and underserved women workers who have been impacted by gender-based violence and harassment (GBVH) in the world of work.

WHAT IT DOES

The FARE grant program provides funding for community-based organizations, worker groups, unions, survivor advocacy organizations, or other nonprofit organizations with well-established ties to underserved and marginalized women workers who are disproportionately impacted by GBVH. The grant program will support nonprofit organizations in their efforts to prevent and respond to GBVH, which is pervasive across industries and deeply impacts the safety and economic security of women workers and survivors.

THE GOALS OF THE GRANT PROGRAM ARE TO:

- 1) Build awareness through the dissemination of information and educational materials that are worker and survivor-centered,
- 2) Implement worker and survivor-driven strategies that mitigate workplace risks and prevent workplace GBVH,
- 3) Connect women workers to services, benefits and/or legal assistance as needed, reasonable and/or available, and
- 4) Facilitate and encourage women workers and survivors to become focal points in their own communities through train-the-trainer, guided conversations, leadership circles, or other activities.

WHO IT SERVES (Target Population)

■ Women workers and survivors with a particular focus on underserved and marginalized women workers who are disproportionately impacted by GBVH, including but not limited to women of color, women with disabilities, justice system-impacted women, individuals who identify as LGBTQI+, marginalized workers in womendominated sectors, ethnic minorities, immigrants, workers with limited English proficiency and workers experiencing substance abuse issues, homelessness, or chronic poverty.
