(NNWJ) National Nuclear Workers for Justice and (PRESS) Portsmouth Piketon Residents for Environmental Safety and Security are requesting that the Advisory Board hold the next meeting in Portsmouth, Ohio since approximately sixty percent of the workers live in Portsmouth.

We have asked the Advisory Board to come to Portsmouth multiple times, but in my opinion, we have been overlooked due to being an economically disadvantaged community. Meetings are held in rich communities that consistently receive more media attention. Our community has some of the highest cancer rates and illnesses in the nation and we deserve to be heard, too!

We are asking the board to find out why the Department of Labor has gone into the local union halls and taken workers' records. These records are critical to employees because they provide the proof necessary to show they worked at the site. The Department of Energy falsified employee's records before the Compensation Bill was passed. And, after the bill, records were shredded, too! We need answers pertaining to workers' records!

Also, what happened to the documents the union hall in Piketon spent hours upon hours gathering information about the toxic chemicals and radiation, as well as, the health effects in every building on-site?

We want answers about DOSE Reconstruction, too. Piketon is an SEC site introduced by Congress, which means workers aren't supposed to have to prove 21 cancers listed on the SEC site. But, Department of Labor, NIOSH and SC&A are forcing sick and dying workers to prove their cancer is related to the plant, even if it is one of the 21 cancers that has ALREADY been approved! Also, families are being turned down for Survivorship.

Finally, we are trying to figure out if all of the exposures to recycle reactor fuel has been left out of the calculations for DOSE. We don't believe that NIOSH and SC& A can properly do DOSE if this information has been withheld. If exposures to recycle reactor fuel has been withheld, in my opinion, workers are being treated UNFAIRLY, and there needs to be an investigation why these agencies haven't looked at the Forensic Radiochemistry of PUBLIC Site Inspection Samples
